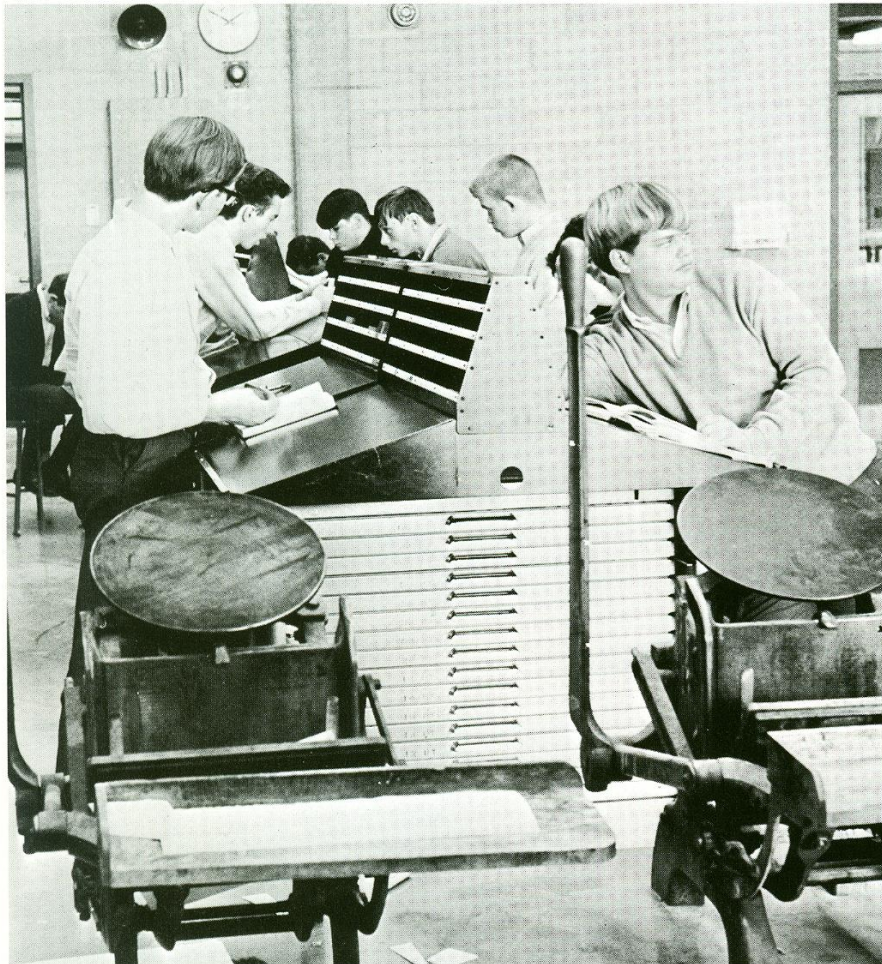


# INDUSTRIAL ARTS INSTRUCT FOR TOMORROW

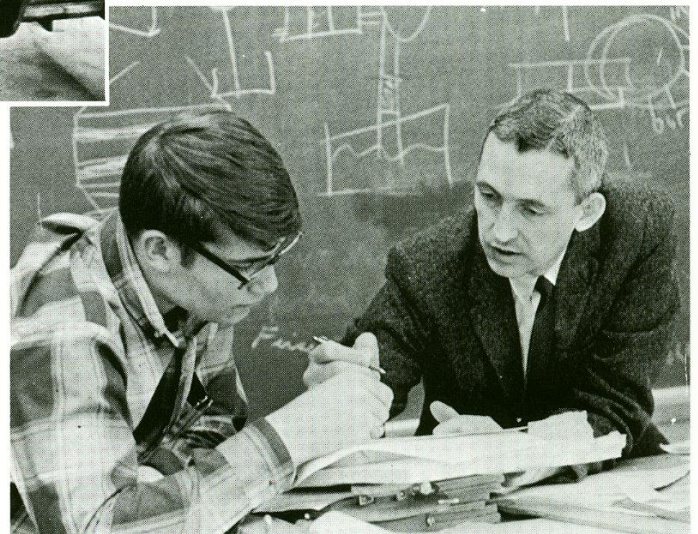
